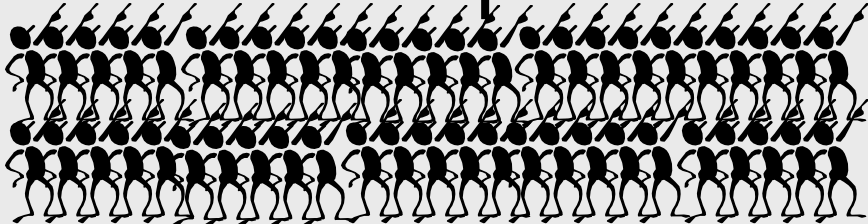

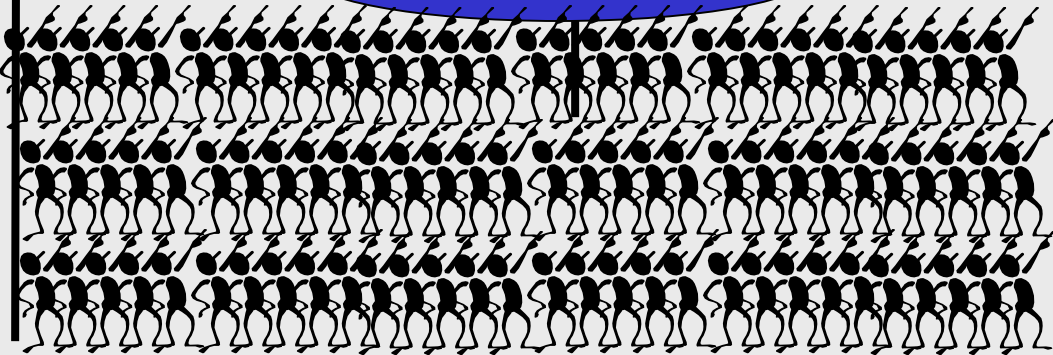

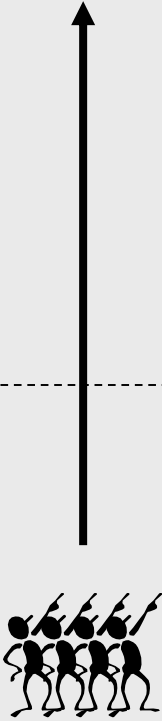

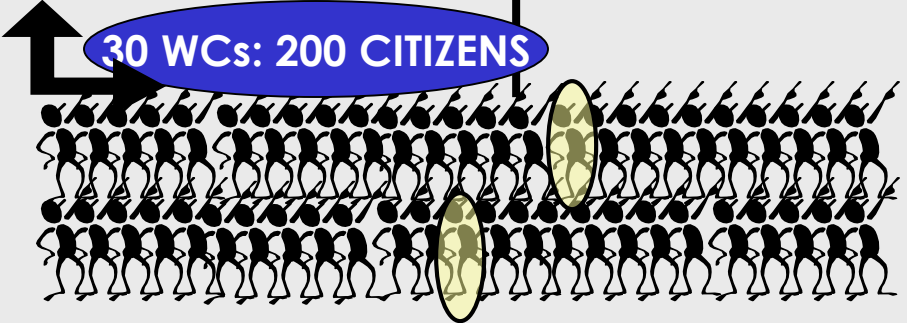

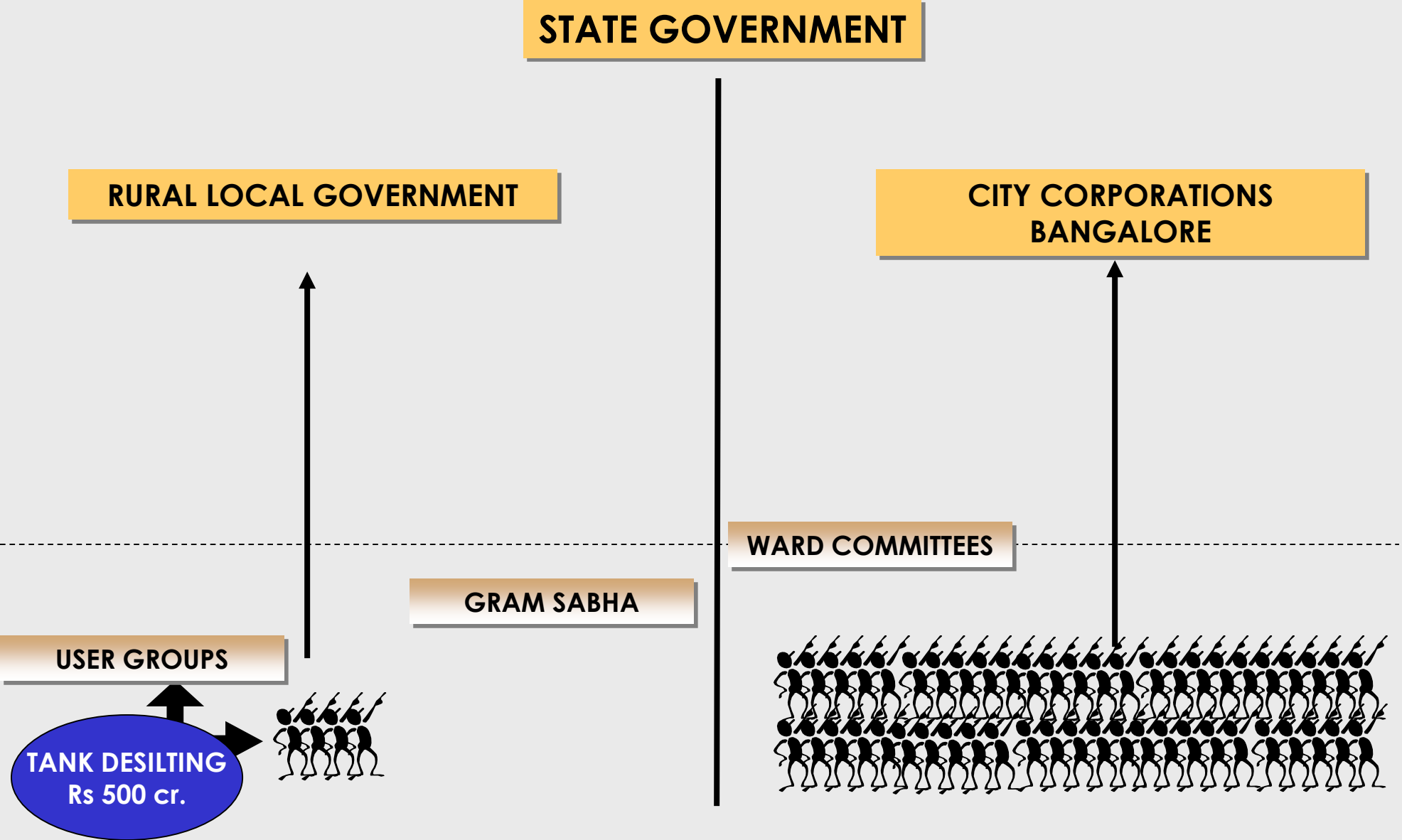

- **Citizen-led, Government-supported initiative**
- **Not just morally right, but economically sound: \$ 700 million of Infrastructure spending, with Budget Surplus in 7 years**
- **Central plank for Political Party, with enormous electoral success: 4 consecutive local victories, increasing regional presence, recent NATIONAL VICTORY (Oct 2002)**
- **“Porto Alegre a way of Government, not just a way of Budgeting” – World Social Forum, Jan 2001**

“Until 5-6 years ago, we had been imposing bureacratic ideas in city administration, to no effect. So we have turned that process around, 180 degrees.

We now come from the premise that most citizens want to be involved in governance

If you start from that, the question becomes, ‘How do we do this?’ rather than ‘Should we do this?’”

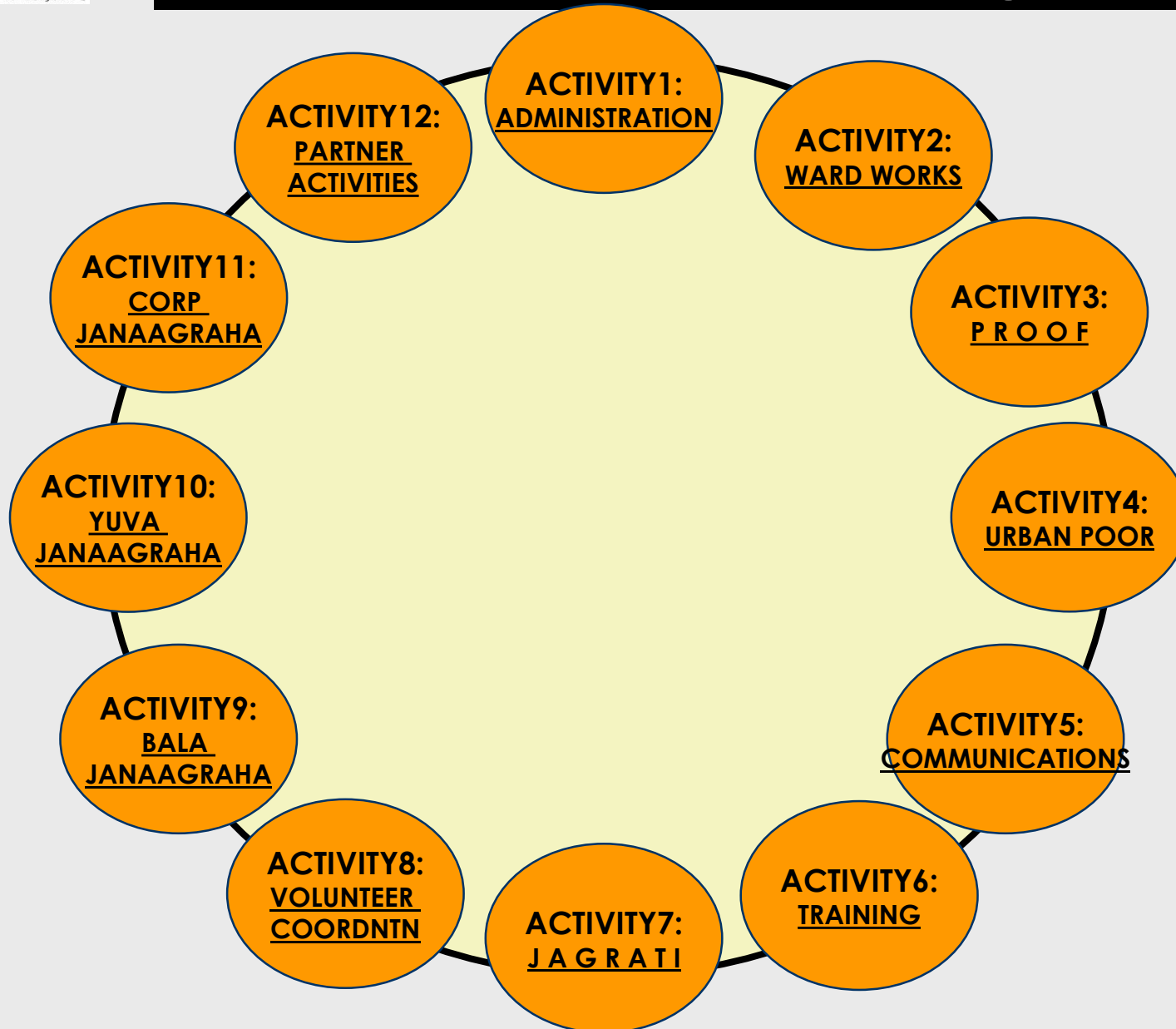

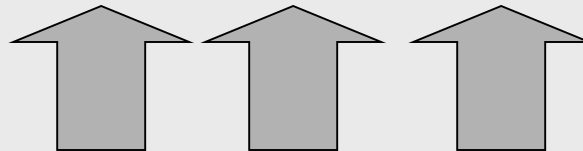

Own Sources



- **The Burning Issue for the BMP**
 - **Raising Resources: Consistent shortfall of 30% - 50%**
- **The Solution**
 - **Plenty of revenue opportunities that can be enhanced: Property tax, Building licences, Advertising, Parking etc.**
- **The Problem with the Solution**
 - **Requires citizens and other stakeholders to voluntarily participate**
- **The Credibility Gap**
 - **Citizens are convinced that government management of money has many weaknesses**
